


24, 2022). In Dobbs, the Court held that “[t]he Constitution does not prohibit the citizens of each State from regulating or prohibiting abortion. Roe and Casey arrogated that authority. We now overrule those decisions and return that authority to the people and their elected representatives.” Id. at *43. In light of that holding, it appears the injunctive relief granted in this case may now be contrary to law. As a result, this court finds the parties should be required to submit briefs setting forth their respective positions on whether the injunction retains any legal force and effect, and whether this court should enter an order pursuant to, inter alia, Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 60(b)(5). Should the parties elect to not file briefs in response to this Order, this court will sua sponte determine an appropriate course of action.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that within thirty days of the entry of this Order, the parties shall submit briefs, no more than 4,000 words in length, addressing the issues described herein. No responses or replies shall be permitted, except upon further order of this court.
