

Q2. National RD/WT: Generally speaking, would you say things in United States are headed in the right direction or off on the wrong track?












Q6. Biden Job Approval: Do you approve or disapprove of the job that Joe Biden is doing as President?

METHODOLOGY

This probabilistic survey was conducted May 4-5, 2024, with 600 likely general election voters. It has a margin of error of $\pm 3.99\%$. Known registered voters were interviewed via live phones and SMS. This survey was weighted to a likely general election voter universe.
