## **METHODOLOGY**

This probabilistic survey was conducted January 22 – 25, 2025, with 606 likely general election voters. It has a margin of error of  $\pm 3.97\%$ . Known registered voters were interviewed via live phones and SMS. This survey was weighted to the likely general election voters universe.
